SUU Target Audience: This one day conference is designed to inform and benefit academic urologists involved in the development and implementation of urology residency training program. The conference should be of special interest to those physicians involved in the education, supervision and evaluation of urology residents in post-graduate training programs.

SUU Needs Statement: The goal of this meeting is to introduce attendees to innovative, contemporary educational techniques designed to teach and evaluate residents in the six core competencies identified by the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education.

SUU Educational Objectives: After the meeting participants should be able to:

- Identify the six core competencies
- Construct a curriculum to teach and evaluate urology residents in outpatient urologic care
- Formulate a curriculum to teach and evaluate urology residents in surgical techniques
- Prepare a curriculum to involve residents in systems based practice
- Describe how to affect change and overcome barriers frequently identified by program chairman

SUCPD Target Audience: This half-day conference is designed to inform and educate urology program directors and chairpersons in a wide range of issues pertaining to the administration of urology departments and divisions with residency programs.

SUCPD Goal: The goal of this meeting is not only to provide attendees with information relating to residency program administration but also to provide opportunities to become actively engaged in the information exchange.

SUCPD Needs Statement: This half-day conference is for academic urology faculty, urology department and division Chairs, and Residency and Fellowship Program Directors. This conference will focus upon updates, changes, and consideration of new educational opportunities available for urology educational programs.
